Dear Friends,

If your household is anything like mine, you are starting to feel the crush of the holiday seasons. I say holiday seasons not Christmas Season since we are just beginning the Advent season and Christmas is not just one day but a twelve day observance culminating in Epiphany. I bring up the semantics of the season because every year seems to heighten the polarization between those who through a desire to be inclusive or politically correct emphasize winter holidays over Christmas and those who want to put the Christ back in Christmas. The divide doesn't feel as abrasive this year as it did almost ten years ago when there was a controversy sweeping through Washington, DC over whether it is the "Christmas season" or the "Winter Holiday season". You may recall that Dennis Hastert, the then Speaker of the House, had decided that the decorated tree in the Capitol was going to be the Congressional Christmas Tree instead of the Congressional Holiday Tree. To the outside observer, this seems reasonable; Jews, Muslims, and presumably observers of all other religions do not decorate evergreen trees at this time of year as part of their religious observances. Therefore, the tree in question is a Christmas tree. The controversy then had to do with potential violations of the separation between Church and State. Those who disagreed with the renaming of the tree may have had a point, but I did not think it was an overt attempt to overturn two hundred plus years of Constitutional law, rather I think it was an attempt to reign in what some in the Christian community had sensed about the increasing secularization of Christmas.

Think about how many of us prepare for the day when we observe the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. We light up our houses. We put up brightly lit and colorfully decorated trees. We make shopping list for both gifts and feasts. We fill our calendars with parties, pageants, and other such events. We take our children to the mall to have their picture made with Santa Claus, and we send off piles of "holiday greetings." Somehow we do manage to squeeze a nativity scene in the front yard along-side the ten-foot tall inflatable Frosty the Snowman. However, driving around town seeing all the decorations, listening to the plans people are making for Christmas weekend, and knowing that Sunday will be a low attendance day has me wondering if maybe those wanting to put Christ back in Christmas are right.

The history of Christmas observances goes back to the early days of Christianity right after it became the official religion of the Roman Empire. In an attempt to speed along the conversion of the Roman pagans to the new religion, the religious authorities adopted the old Roman festival of the winter solstice as the new feast of the nativity complete with "Christ Mass." Somehow I think what we have done in recent years is lose the religion and turn back to the celebration of an old pagan festival. Maybe the Puritans had it right some three hundred years ago when they outlawed the observance of Christmas. Since everyday was a day of the Lord's making why did we need to observe a festival to recognize the Lord's presence in the world? Every Sunday worship was a celebration of Jesus' birth, life, death, and resurrection, it was in short the Lord's Day, and had been for centuries. The interesting thing about the Sunday worship was that in the beginning of Christianity when it was still a minor Jewish sect, Sunday was a normal workday. Saturday was the Sabbath, the day of rest and formal religious observances. Sunday the faithful had to be intentional and carve out part of the busy day to worship our Lord and Savior. Thus it seems ironic that in years when the Lord's Day and Christmas intersect (like next year because of the leap) many choose to ere on the side of a modern pagan festival and refuse to carve out some time for God.

I am not sure yet how we will observe Christmas on the Lord's Day in 2016 here at CPC. It will probably be a scaled down version of our usual Lord's Day worship and may even look like our new Koinonia service. The service may be earlier in the morning, since I have doubts about Sunday School attendance. We might even be in pajamas having just opened presents. Whatever form it takes know that it will be a day that the Lord will make, and we will rejoice and be glad in it. In any case that is for next year. As for this year we will worship and celebrate for nearly a month and a half the Light coming into the world. May you all be filled with the joy of the seasons and show forth the light of Christ in the world during these seasons of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany.
